I am somewhat at a loss regarding what to do about your transportation. However, I will set my secretary, Mrs. Goldfischer, to work on this, to be subject to your approval in whole or in part.

I don't know what the accommodations are from Green Bank to Gainesville and return, nor from Green Bank to any place else and return, but I have suggested to her that she make reservations and arrange to send you tickets to travel by air whenever possible and to obtain a rented car for your convenience where appropriate.
