12/11/62

Buck Mezettis secured a lot of sticks about 3 to 4 ft long of Lowland Poplar from Huon. These sticks were trimmed to half cylinders and placed top end up in buckets of water. all previous buds, if any, were removed.

14/11/62 Water level going down as sticks absorb water.
Buckets of sticks kept in shade of greenhouse with metal roof.

10/11/63 all pots of water poisoned by bacteria and sticks are dead. Apparently water must be changed frequently, sticks placed in running water or sticks planted in moist soil. The best is probably the last,

Before laying about half dozen sticks sent up new buds. These were all at places where old buds had been on surface at small lumps in bark. Not a single bud appeared at cut edge or cut end. The test was poor, but did not even begin to duplicate results of Shapord.
