During the past year I have put the best face possible on my letters to Jennie. Unfortunately, a social problem exists and the truth of the matter is I'm a bit unhappy and sort of lonesome. I cannot continue to adventure indefinitely. Last 22nd Decmeber I was 52 years old. After putting it off for 25 or 30 years after the normal time; I would like to get married and settle down somewhere. This is the nicest place I've been able to find. Unfortunately, I do not wish to give up my American Citizenship. Consequently, I cannot in good faith marry an Australian. There appears to be only two practical arrangements.

- (a) I become an Australian, marry an Australian and stay.
- (b) I close up in a year or so, return to America, marry an American and remain.

The whole matter seems to be unsolvable. It is not my custom to make anap decisions. This letter is merely to appraise you of my general thinking, or lack thereof.
